Sybil Smith Family Village (SSFV)

Dumas Wesley Community Center's Transitional Housing Program, Sybil H. Smith Family Village, was founded in 1999 to fill a void in housing services for single women and women with children experiencing homelessness. To date, the program has served 2,422 individuals from Southwest and Central Alabama, coastal Mississippi, and North Florida. coastal Mississippi, and North Florida.





Housing

A 17-unit transitional housing program that provides 24 months of housing for up to 61 individuals



Eligibility

Residents must be: homeless, 24 years of age of older, able to work or enroll in school, willing to live in a drug and alcohol free environment and participate in a case management



Services

Individualized case management, life șkills classes, behavior modification and mental health resources

21,211 bednights provided for homeless individuals in shelter

1,906 <u>individualized</u> case management sessions and 85 life skills classes offered

14 out of 15 families successfully transitioned from homelessness to permanent housing

0% of SSFV graduates returned to homelessness compared to the hational recidiyism rate of 19%

BFV is operated by the Dumas Wesley Community Center and modeled after its highly successful transitional housing program, the Sybil Smith Family Village.

Residents must be: homeless, 24 years of age of older, able to work or enroll in school, willing to live in a drug and alcohol free environment and participate in a case management plan. BFV provides 12 months of housing and wrap-around services for up to 100 women and abildron appulls. children annually.

- Help residents secure and retain permanent housing upon completion of the BFV program.
